#### Report of the trustees as at year ended 31 March 2009

The trustees present their report together with the audited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2009.

Legal and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting By Charities.

## Objects and activities of the charity

The objects of the charity are the protection and preservation of public health and for the relief of sickness by disseminating to general practitioners and other health care professionals, the results of research and other information concerned with the causes, the transmission and the treatment of Human Immuno Deficiency Virus (HIV), and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and related conditions so as to improve the treatment of patients and prevent the spread of HIV and AIDS and related conditions; by providing information, advice and other assistance to those with HIV or AIDS or related conditions and to their families and carers and to benefit individuals, both nationally and internationally; through dissemination of up-to-date medical and social information related to the treatment of HIV/AIDS and other related health issues.

### To achieve these objects the charity produces:

- HIV Treatment Bulletin, a monthly publication and technical review of the latest medical research aimed at doctors and other healthcare professionals and distributed through our postal mailing list, electronically and through clinics.
- A range of non-technical treatment guides, being easy to understand treatment information publications for people living with HIV. Distribution as above and to other community organisations.
- Multi-lingual translations of publications.
- UK CAB community education training for HIV positive people and their advocates.
- A treatment information phone line and support service by post, email and online.
- A website broadening access to our publications and archives and publicising our activities.
- Training courses to encourage a network of community advocates within local communities around the UK, especially with African communities.

In addition we also develop links with similar organisations working outside the UK, particularly in Europe, Eastern Europe, the USA and Africa on joint material and project development, training, education and support. We also serve on community advisory boards and steering committees with the objective that the needs of HIV positive people are represented in planning research and clinical trials.

#### Constitution

The company is a company limited by guarantee, and as such has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of a winding up of the company is limited to £10. The company's governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Organisation

The trustees who have served during the year are set out on page 1. Trustees are appointed by the board of trustees. At each annual general meeting one third of the trustees retire by rotation and may be reappointed.

Financial Review and Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, at a level which equates to approximately three months total expenditure. At the year end the free reserves had not reached this target level and the trustees continue to make efforts to raise additional unrestricted funds. The Trustees are pleased to report that in the year a successful grant application was made to The Monument Trust for support for our publications both in the UK and in Southern Africa, the phone line and other projects as well as some core costs. This grant of £570,000 over two years will, with other funding received and expected, for the first time, provide a degree of financial stability which the organisation has lacked since it's inception.

Net resources expended for the year amounted to £22,579 compared to a surplus of £21,984 in the prior year. Volatility in income is due to the charity having a relatively small number of funders and the timing of the grants which we receive from them. The trustees anticipate a surplus in the next financial year due to the funding agreed by The Monument Trust over the next two years.

Review of activities and future developments

HIV i-Base is a treatment activist group, HIV-positive led and committed to providing timely HIV treatment information both to healthcare professionals and to positive people themselves. HIV i-Base was formed in March 2000 and has continued to cover the most innovative and important medical advances in HIV and AIDS.

#### **HIV i-Base Projects**

### **Publications**

In our ninth year as a charity we have continued to produce HIV Treatment Bulletin (HTB) and our community publications. We have published new editions of our treatment guides for patients — 'Introduction to Combination Therapy; Changing Treatment; Avoiding and Managing Side Effects; HIV, Pregnancy and Women's Health amd HIV and Hepatitis C coinfection. We produced a new publication 'Clinical trials: a community guide to HIV research', which aims to guide people in their choices about participation in research programmes. The publication is being translated into a number of European languages with support from NEAT.

Unfortunately, during this period, we lost TIPI funding for London provision of our treatment guides, we are grateful to several clinics, who generously made emergency donations to help us continue these services. BHIVA continues to provide funding to distribute HTB to their membership.

We continue to produce ARV4IDUs as an electronic publication. This quarterly bulletin is produced in both English and Russian language editions. This project is funded by the Open Society Institute (OSI).

During the year we continued our consultancy role with the Community Health Media Trust (CHMT) in South Africa as part of a project funded by the UK DfID. One outcome for i-Base from this project was the pilot first two issues of a Southern Africa version of HTB, called HTB South. We are now producing this publication quarterly as part of our work in Southern Africa funded by The Monument Trust. HTB South is distributed as an insert with the Southern African Journal of HIV Medicine and electronically to over 15,000 members of the South African Clinicians Society. The publication uses both articles from HTB and additional material specifically relevant to Southern Africa. HIV i-Base now maintains a permanent base in Cape Town, South Africa and one of our Editorial Directors spends a considerable portion of time there. We are planning to expand these activities further in particular to build local technical capacity and are currently seeking funding for this part of the project.

We continue to produce adherence support material such as the "treatment passports" that give patients the opportunity to keep a record of their own treatment history and the adherence pads developed with and used by pharmacists.

Our resource of translated information has continued to grow to over 35 languages. An ongoing grant from the NEAT European research group facilitated many of these translations into Italian, Portuguese, Spanish and Russian.

All materials continue to be produced copyright free and are free individually and in bulk within the UK. Subscriptions continue to increase both by post and electronically. All publications continue to be posted to our website both in html and pdf formats.

Meetings

We continue the programme of inter-organisation treatment training workshops with many community groups around the UK as well as the UK-CAB, which holds four training meetings each year.

Following the report on the treatment information needs of African patients in London, produced last year, we are working with a number of community groups to provide treatment training workshops using specially designed training materials we The first course of workshops was held in are developing for the purpose. conjunction with Body and Soul and ran for 8 weeks. A key objective is to improve participants treatment literacy in order to support broader treatment literacy in African. communities. We provide ongoing support for workshop participants and encourage the most successful participants to join and participate in the UK-CAB in the hope that they will be able to communicate their new skills within their particular communities.

#### The UKCAB

The quarterly meetings cover a broad range of subjects which this year included longterm cardiovascular risks of ARVs, information on the Yellow Card scheme, transitional care from Paediatric to Adult services, immunology as well as feedback from conferences such as the International AIDS Conference held in Mexico in 2008, CROI and others. We have been fortunate enough, as in all our meetings, to have support from world class British and international experts who provide some of these training workshops

The UKCAB has benefited from the employment of the UK-CAB administrator who started work in August and is working to expend the membership of the organisation as well as manage the administrative requirements of the group.

Membership has increased from 198 to 271 who now represent around 120 UK organisations.

UKCAB has had a stand at both the BHIVA autumn conference and the HIV9 conference in Glasgow. The stand is available for member organisations to display materials and serves to promote the UKCAB within the HIV community.

Attendance at the quarterly meetings has increased by about 25% during this period. A survey of members was conducted to choose topics for future meetings and one of these topics, *HIV and mental health*, will, as a result, be the community session at the 2009 autumn BHIVA conference and will be chaired by a UKCAB steering group member.

We continue to produce detailed reports following each UKCAB meeting.

The UKCAB receives a grant from The Monument Trust for which HIV i-Base provides secretariat services.

## Phone line and Information services

These services have continued to develop and respond to growing demand. We believe we continue to be the expert referral service allowing patients to get an informed second opinion on any treatment based query. The web-based Q&A services have proved very popular and demand for electronic access to these services has doubled over the last year.

An international service in Russian and Bulgarian answered over 500 enquiries.

### Website/IT

All i-Base publications continue to be simultaneously published on the website and our online Q&A has answered over 900 questions all of which remain online for others to consult, thus creating a growing resource of treatment questions and answers.

The website is continually updated and designed to have fast access so as to be suitable for people with dial-up or unreliable access to the internet.

The IT department has continued to upgrade i-Base's IT infrastructure as funds have allowed.

As well as maintaining the HIV i-Base website our IT department manages the UKCAB website which has an email discussion list and all notifications of meetings and reports are posted to it.

#### Risk management

The trustees have examined the major risks to which the charity is exposed and confirm that systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

#### **Investment powers**

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit.

## Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the financial year and of its surplus or deficit for the financial year. In doing so the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Action 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Auditors

A resolution will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting that Wilkins Kennedy be re-appointed as auditors to the charity for the ensuing year.

## Independent auditors report to the members of HIV i-Base

## Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2009

### 1. Accounting policies

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007), applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005), issued in March 2005. The charity has utilised the provisions of paragraph 3 (3) of schedule 4 of the Companies Act 1985 and adapted the Companies Act formats to reflect the special nature of the charity's activities.

#### (a) Grants

Grants are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable. Such income is only deferred when the donor specifies that the grant must only be used in future accounting periods. Grants received for specific purposes are treated as restricted funds.

## (b) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

## (c) Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the term of the lease.

#### (d) Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised at cost.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Office equipment

40% reducing balance basis

#### (e) Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:

Unrestricted general funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds - these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
